Answers to DIGGER Quiz No. 34

- 1. 'Jacka's Mob' was written by Edgar John Rule.
- 2. 'Jacka's Mob' was first published in 1933.
- 3. Jacka's mob was the 14th Battalion, which formed part of the 4th Brigade (which became part of the 4th Division after Gallipoli).
- 4. The history of the 14th Battalion was written by Newton Wanliss, whose son Harold served in the 14th Battalion and was killed in action on 26th September 1917.
- 5. Around 5 500 men passed through the ranks of the 14th Battalion.
- 6. Rule reached the rank of Temporary Captain and was awarded the MM and MC.
- 7. The 14th Battalion was formed from Victorian enlistments, mostly drawn from Melbourne and suburbs.
- 8. Jacka also received the MC and Bar.
- 9. Jacka won the VC at Courtney's Post, Gallipoli, on 19th May 1915.
- 10. Joseph Bickley, William Howard, Frank Poliness and Stephen De'Araugo played a part in the VC-winning exploit.
- 11. The 14th Battalion was given the nickname the 'Bacon Stealers'.
- 12. Padre Andrew Gillison and Chaplain Frances Rolland.
- 13. Lieutenant Colonel JH Peck CMG, DSO (known affectionately as 'Dear Old Dad').
- 14. Jacka had his problems with Major General Charles Henry Brand CB, CMG, DSO.
- 15. Lieutenant Colonel Charles Dare DSO.

The Aussie who had endured a long succession of sunless days in frigid Belgium, regarded the landscape with keen interest. 'What's all that bright-looking stuff laying about all over the place?' he enquired of a cobber. They both contemplated it with deep curiosity. The light of recognition gradually appeared on the cobber's face. 'I remember it!' he said reminiscently, as of one recalling a circumstance of the vague long ago – 'it's sunlight!'
